A MESSAGE FROM GRO ROBINSON, OUR NEW PRESIDENT

Greetings - all you wonderful people!

Being elected your President at the summer convention, was a true high point in my life. It is a "high" that has stayed with me because, as I said then, this was perhaps the first time I felt that I was chosen - chosen for being me, rather than just for some job I had done. The entire convention was a beautiful experience for me. I thank all of you for your trust in me, and I shall do all I can to help the IPA grow!

A chief thrust of this administration will be to make our conferences, which I see as our most vital function, even more fulfilling and enriching. The conferences, especially our five-day summer conventions, are our unique way as a primal community of sharing who we are and what we know, and exploring new ways of being and living as fully feeling persons.

Another priority for me will be to set up a system that will respond more promptly to members, new and old, as well as to outside inquiries. (This summer, I was especially pleased with our Australian connection — and dismayed by the difficulties Marny and Graham had in reaching us!)

What I am eager to do is to solidify our core, to foster networks and community. I want to reach out to former members who for various reasons have dropped out, to reestablish contact: "Hey, we need you, we need each other. Don't let old grievances or lethargy or a \$15 membership fee stand in your way!" I am also eager to see all of those who have shared with us and expressed interest in IPA become members.

At our next board meeting, January 25th, following our New York Conference, we will discuss our constitution and by-laws and attempt to effect some needed changes — including a workable Code of Ethics for therapists.

Over the last few years, I have increasingly felt good about belonging to the IPA. I have seen a new spirit of acceptance and cooperation, a new surge of energy, that makes me hopeful about the viability and growth of our organization.

I am not so worried about our differences. I see dissent and dialogue as an integral part of growth and life process, and that divergence will ultimately help us define what unites us and bring us closer together. In this light, I have welcomed the debate about changing our name to one without "primal." The arguments, pro and con, have helped me realize that the name "primal" is still important to me, and that I, for one, want to keep it in the IPA! I am no longer concerned that we (the IPA) become "respectable," or "accepted," or even increase our membership. (I see this as already happening, without our even trying!)

Most of all, I feel that belonging to the IPA, working for the IPA is a rewarding experience, but IPA needs help. We need you! Apart from a few jobs done by a paid secretary, all the work to run the IPA is done by volunteers. Your board and staff-members, although dedicated and committed, fall prey to such human frailties as illness, overload and other crisis situations. If you have a gripe or are not satisfied, don't blame — pitch in! If you have hours to spare, we can use you — planning conferences, opening and answering mail, making calls and helping with the Newsletter. Extra help is always needed publicizing and hosting our conferences. To volunteer your services, write or call me, Carol Capizzi or Jean Getoff or call Jane Mann for the Newsletter. Alec Rubin and Fred Zielke can really use help on the upcoming New York Conference. And if you think of some old friend who you would like to see back in the IPA, pick up the phone!

Finally, some words of acknowledgment to everyone who helped make the IPA what it is today. In particular, our thanks to those of the last administration and those others who worked so hard to make the annual convention such a memorable experience: Fred Zielke, Lin Whittle, Loretta Fogel, Lisa Novick, Harriet Geller, Ross Klahr and Dean Shaw. And very special thanks to Alan McFarland and Lisa for the beautiful job they did with the Newsletter!

With the help of you, the members, I am looking forward to a great year with continuous growth and community.

I remember your workshop outside last year where we went on an observing kind of expedition outside in a field. I was feeling very bad when I came to your workshop and it was a very healing experience. I remember writing some things in columns that also seemed vaguely interesting, but it was the excursion into the nearby meadow that was really good for me. I remember I spent most of it on my hands and knees and it must have been a lot like time I spent when I was very little, really seeing all the beautiful and fascinating plants and bugs that were there, a place just teeming with life that I hardly ever noticed. I remember feeling sorry for myself that I spent so little time in my life really seeing the life (other than human) that existed around me. For the first time in years I did a little gardening this year and I felt that somehow, with my bare feet and hands working in the earth, I was more in tune with the universe. I am afraid that part of my enjoyment came from reliving the days when I was a little kid and played in the backyard sandbox another sort of happy primal experience. I find as much benefit in going back to the happy parts of my childhood as I do in going back to the sad parts. There are many things that I was once programmed to do and which made me contented and loved then that are not valuable for me now. Also there are many things that I did then, that I had forgotten I had done which still are very valuable to me today. I need reprogramming of some old happy times and reinforcement of others.

Sometimes I think of primal as a sort of controlled nervous breakdown where you stop the on-going pattern of your life if it is not accomplishing what you want and review your entire life experiences (from conception almost) and reinforce some experiences, wipe out some experiences and realign a lot of them.


